The Jubilee of Hope, inaugurated by Pope Francis on Christmas Eve 2024, will come to an end with a series of solemn ceremonies in the main basilicas of Rome, culminating in a historic act presided over by Pope Leo XIV in St. Peter's Basilica.

After twelve months of pilgrimage, in which it is estimated that nearly 30 million faithful have crossed the sacred thresholds in search of plenary indulgence, the Vatican has formalized

the “countdown” for the sealing of the bronze porticos.

The closure of the **Holy Door** will symbolically denote the end of the **Holy Year**, yet the message of grace and reconciliation of the Jubilee will endure in the Church and within the hearts of the faithful. This act extends an invitation to all believers to persevere in their spiritual journey with renewed faith, having passed through the Holy Door as a symbol of conversion and hope.

The Jubilee Year concludes with the closing of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica Jan. 6, 2026, on the feast of the Epiphany. However, the Holy Doors at Rome's other major basilicas will close Dec. 28, 2025, the same day dioceses are to end local celebrations of the Holy Year.

Closing Prayer:

O God, our Father, you accompany and sustain your Church in its pilgrim journey; through the light and the strength of your spirit, stir up in us a living hope, so that we may recognize the signs of your presence in the events of our world.

Grateful for all the graces received during this Holy Year, we have journeyed here as Pilgrims of Hope to experience the outpouring of mercy from the heart of our Lord Jesus Christ, the door of our salvation. It is he whom the Church is called to proclaim always, everywhere and to all people and nations as our hope.

Be near to those who call on you, O Lord, and graciously grant your protection to all who place their hope in your mercy, that they may remain faithful in holiness of life and, become bearers of hope, reconciliation, freedom, and justice, through Christ our Lord.

Reflecting on Pope Leo's call for an unarmed peace for a wounded world

As the Church marked the World Day of Peace on January 1st, Pope Leo XIV's first message for the occasion is centred on the call for an “unarmed and disarming” peace. It also refers to a peace that is “humble and persevering”, and it places Gospel nonviolence at the heart of the Church's response to a world increasingly marked by conflict, fear, and fragmentation.

Speaking with Vatican News, the director of Pax Christi's Catholic Institute for Nonviolence, describes the Pope's message as deeply coherent with the direction Pope Leo XIV has charted since the earliest moments of his papacy.

“It is so entirely consistent with what Pope Leo has been saying from the very beginning,” she says. “His immediate reference to peace - peace that is unarmed and disarming, humble and persevering.” An “unarmed” peace, she says, does not depend on coercion, military force, or the accumulation of weapons, pointing to Pope Leo's explicit reference to the enormous global investment in war and preparations for war. “It does not rely on that kind of preparation—or on violence itself.”
